We have a developed network of stakeholders who support our work on a thematic basis


We deliver training such as:

New to Participatory Public Art Projects



- Cavan Institute are our collaborative partner in the Arts4Rights Project
- They are the largest provider of Vocational and Adult Education in our region and have 1,200 students on campus daily and 600 adult learners attending evening classes
- In 2013, they acquired an old army barracks in Cavan town with the intention of creating a new campus for Further and Vocational Education
- To be opened in 2023, this location [place] offered the perfect setting for the Arts4Rights project






As part of the Good Friday Agreement, the Department of Defence began a process of decommissioning military barracks along the border with Northern Ireland which brought about the closure of the barracks in Co. Cavan.

As a state asset, the barracks were transferred to the Department of Education and opened as part of the Cavan Institute Campus for students in 2023. The first known presence of the Irish military in Co. Cavan dates to 1793. Up until recently the military barracks in Cavan where the oldest in the world.





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Our interpretation of the brief

- Place is what gives a space meaning, "personality" and a connection to a cultural identity. It is the "vibe" that you get from a certain space, and it exists for a reason.
- Within the new campus, the students wanted to create a place that was welcoming, meaningful and bridged what it means to be Irish and European.


Equality and the Salmon of Knowledge




Solidarity and Na Fianna

The Fianna was a mighty group of warriors that guarded Ireland for the high king Ireland who lived at Tara.


Meaning behind the Art



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Public Exhibition – Next Steps

- We are planning to launch the Arts4Rights exhibition at the Cavan Institute Campus to coincide with the week of festivities surrounding St. Patrick's Day (17th March 2024) and it will run until 9th May 2024 (to make Europe Day)
